

## Connecticut SAT School Day Reporting

Below are answers to questions pertaining to the College Board Online Scoring Portal and the Connecticut State Department of Education (CSDE) reporting web site known as EdSight. There are distinctions for each site that should be noted.

College Board Online Scoring Portal	CSDE EdSight
<b>How do users access this site?</b>

<b>Are individual student scores included in the site?</b>	
Individual student scores are included on this site for those who have “detail” level access or access to the downloadable files. “Summary” level access will not provide access to individual scores.	Individual student scores are not included on this site. Only summary numbers are reported at the school, district and state level. EdSight will eventually allow authorized personnel to have access to individual student scores through a secure login.
<b>Which students are reported on each site?</b>	
This site includes student scores for all students with a valid score for college entrance. Students who qualified for State Allowed Accommodations, students who cancelled their scores and/or students with scores on hold* are not included in this site. Average scores by school and district are also included.	This site includes an average score by school and district that includes all students who attempted at least one test item in either subject area (English language arts or math). It includes students qualified for State Allowed Accommodations, students who cancelled their scores and/or students with scores on hold*. Students with significant cognitive disabilities who were designated to take the Connecticut Alternate Assessment (CTAA) and students who are medically exempt from assessments are excluded from the SAT Assessment Report. Only grade 11 students who were registered in PSIS at the time of testing are included.
<b>Are average scores and student counts included?</b>	
The College Board portal includes averages scores and student counts for those students with valid scores. It does not include students who qualified for State Allowed Accommodations, students who cancelled their scores and/or students with scores on hold*.	EdSight includes average scores and student counts for students with valid scores, cancelled scores and scores on hold*.
<b>How are students attributed to schools?</b>	
Students are attributed to the school they coded on their answer booklet as attending when they took the test.	A student is included in the public school where they are enrolled during the testing window as reported to the CSDE in PSIS. Non-public students are reported at the district level.
<b>How are students who attend a private approved special education program reported?</b>	
Those students are reported to the school they attend.	Those students are included in the district average with the sending district and not the outplaced facility. School-level tables exclude nonpublic organizations such as approved private special education programs. Students enrolled in these programs are included in the district level analyses based on the CSDE Reporting District.
<b>How are scores reported?</b>	

\*A student can have a score on hold for various reasons. A hold can be for security reasons, for test irregularities in the test center, for data matching problems or for some other issue where it takes more time to process the scores. Once the hold is resolved, the score will be released to the student and included in the College Board Online Scoring Portal.

<b>College Board Online Scoring Portal</b>	<b>CSDE EdSight</b>
Scores are reported by total score for students and average scores. Student level scores include the percentile, the individual student score, and benchmark attainment. Summary scores report means, percent attaining benchmarks, as well as question analysis scores and sub-scores.	For ELA and math, the EdSight reports provide counts of test-takers, counts and percentages scoring in each of the four levels, as well as average test scores.
